Year 4 - Honey - "I want to show appreciation to Porsha as she has been checking in with me each day to see if I am okay."


Year 5 - Darcee, "I want to show appreciation to Layla for always being there for me when I am sad."

There are no changes to PAN or oversubscription criteria for Weston Shore Infant School or Weston Park Primary School. There is a proposed reduction in PAN to 60 for Glenfield Infant School.
